JANUARY

FEBRUARY



The company announced that all employees at AJE and NEWCo would be provided with life assurance.

MARCH

APRIL

April was an extremely busy month and projects included the completion of steelworks for a new four-star hotel on the Isle of Skye, plans being drawn up to supply and install cladding for a nursery building also on Skye, and the pouring of the concrete flooring at Waterford.

Work also began on Goat Island on Stornoway to design, fabricate and install a new building for the Stornoway Port Authority and a complicated project on a maintenance depot for trains got underway at Craigentinny in Edinburgh.



JULY

There was another significant step forward at Waterford with the equipment being installed.

The fully automated equipment, which was imported from Italy carried out the marking, drilling and cutting tasks on long steel sections allowing AJE's skilled work force more time to focus on complex fabrications. The installation has seen the company able to increase its work output.



OCTOBER

Alan announced staff could continue to work from home. Excellent directorship given the situation at the end of 2021.

We were also involved in story of Wester Ross's importance to Arctic Convoy efforts during WW2 by designing, fabricating and installing aluminium frames that display three mosaics designed by local pupils.

We also began fabricating safety barriers for the Tolbooth in Forres. They have since been installed and the clocktower will be opened to the public later this year.





May saw the start of works to a historic visitor centre which included the installation of a repaired and replica chimney. Teams from AJE and NEWCo were working on the project in Lyness on the Island of Hoy.

The NEWCo team played a significant role in this project with two existing steel chimneys with historical significance being transported to their Fort-William premises where the team repaired one and fabricated a replica of the other.

AUGUST

A four week internship gave secondary school student Lucy Paul an insight into AJE and showed the company's commitment to inspiring young people into engineering.

The company became involved with Career Ready, a national charity which believes that every young person deserves the opportunity to kick-start a rewarding future.



NOVEMBER

The top story for November had to be the visit by The Princess Royal who visited our Forres complex and officially opened the multi-million- pound facility at Waterford.

Her Royal Highness was shown AJE's HQ at the Greshop Industrial Estate where she met members of staff who spoke about the numerous projects the business has worked on and was given an insight into the firm's CNC machine shop.



JUNE

A more unusual story was the lead this month, but it was one that shows that AJE is invested in the local community. The story covered the fact that the company supported a gull management trial in the Pilmuir Primary School area of Forres. The one-year pilot is being joint funded by AJE, the Forres Common Good Fund and the school itself.

Gull nesting is prevalent in that area of Forres and it's hoped that the removal of nests and eggs will allow residents and landlords to take action to prevent ongoing nesting.

SEPTEMBER

Maintenance contracts are a big part of what AJE does and a team were back to Burghead Maltings to work on a three-day project.

The work focused on 'Elevator E20' where the team replaced the belt and buckets which are the internal mechanism in the elevator casing to lift



the product from the kiln.

Overseeing the works was Project Manager Allan Martin, he said: "We've done this work at Burghead Maltings a few years back and we were delighted to be back again."

DECEMBER

A team from AJE set off on an epic commute - to Antarctica. A number of them travelled aboard the RRS Sir David Attenborough. The team arrived just before Christmas and will be working at the British Antarctic Survey's Rothera Research Station.

The team are working on behalf of main BAM Nuttall who recently secured a 10-year, £500m contract to upgrade and extend BAS's polar research stations. We look forward to numerous updates from the team over the coming weeks.
